



Although the equipment is expensive, especially if bought all at one time, it is for the safety of the crew and vessel, and to venture offshore without it is unwise whether cruising or racing. To sail singlehanded without adequate safety and survival gear is folly verging on irresponsibility and goes directly against the aims of the Singlehanded Sailing Society to promote better and safer sailing. Without the equipment requirements, neither the insurance companies nor the Coast Guard would permit the races.

Secretary's Notes

With two official races behind us a picture is beginning to develop and the Society now has more definite directions to follow.

The turnouts for the races have exceeded original expectations and comments so far have been favorable, but we do need more volunteer help for race committee officials and representatives.

Remarks and comments received so far are about an even split between wanting longer and shorter courses. This can be arranged both ways only if boat sizes became split roughly 50/50 large and small. Presently the average size is around 30 to 32 LOA, with only 4 boats falling below a 25' length. Small boat skippers are going to have to go out and round up more competition for their class. It would be great if each race had at least 10 under 25 footers!

On an average, equipment and rigging troubles have been unusually high for such short races. Winds have been high but it looks like we're going to need to take a second look at how we rig our boats. Fatigue is also unusually high indicating a lack of proper planning for crew protection and rig handling.

It seems that the Farralons race gave us all a greater appreciation of what offshore cruising or racing can be like. Some participants will probably go on to longer races like the Transatlantic or upcoming Solo Transpac while others will no doubt sail crewed vessels from here on out. Race results indicate that **Society members were better prepared** than non-society members. New events for 1978 will include:

Unscheduled Events

From time to time the national offices of the Society will sanction other singlehanded events throughout the world as requested by clubs and sub-chapters requiring an official Transpac qualifying race or any event that is provided for the testing of gear or techniques.

Copies of the General Conditions of each individual race will be available thru the Society approximately 90 days prior to the start date of said events.

Members will be sent said conditions while non-members can obtain copies by writing the Society.

Newsletter

Besides providing an individual with the opportunity to meet and share ideas and experiences with other singlehanded sailors, Society membership entitles you to: receive four copies per year of the Singlehander. The Society newsletter contains news briefs, interviews, tech articles and helpful hints. Thru the newsletter we will attempt to answer questions, air complaints, propose experiments, record race results, and in general cover those areas of interest in detail, that are too lengthy to be satisfactorily covered at membership meetings.
